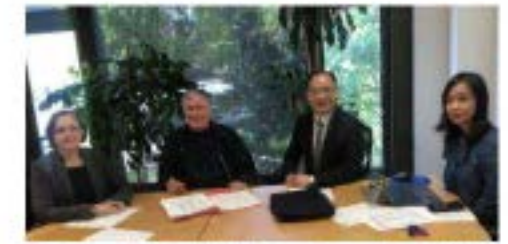
Tariff of Fees for Architectural Services Project | Update

April 30, 2019

In July 2018, a [volunteer opportunity](#) was presented in 'Connected' to take part in the Tariff of Fees for Architectural Services Update Project. The initiative began as a Member Motion from the Floor at the 2017 Annual Meeting: "Review of Bylaw 55: Tariff for Market Multiple Residential Sector, December 2001 – in which we do not feel necessarily represents sufficient fees for the complexity of modern day process."

The AIBC's Tariff of Fees for Architectural Services, authorized by the Architects Act and AIBC Bylaw 29, is an important reference document for architects and their clients. It provides recommended fee and architectural services levels and can be used for project budgeting and planning. Architects are required, under Bylaw 34.16, to provide services and receive fees in substantial accord with the Tariff. This professional expectation is in place, in the public interest, as a preventative measure against inadequate services.

The volunteer component of the work for the Tariff of Fees for Architectural Services Update Project began in December 2018. To date, there have been more than 25 project meetings between seven different working groups. Each group represents a different building type; residential, commercial, healthcare, public assembly, educational, transportation and industrial. In total, there are 22 volunteers involved with the project.



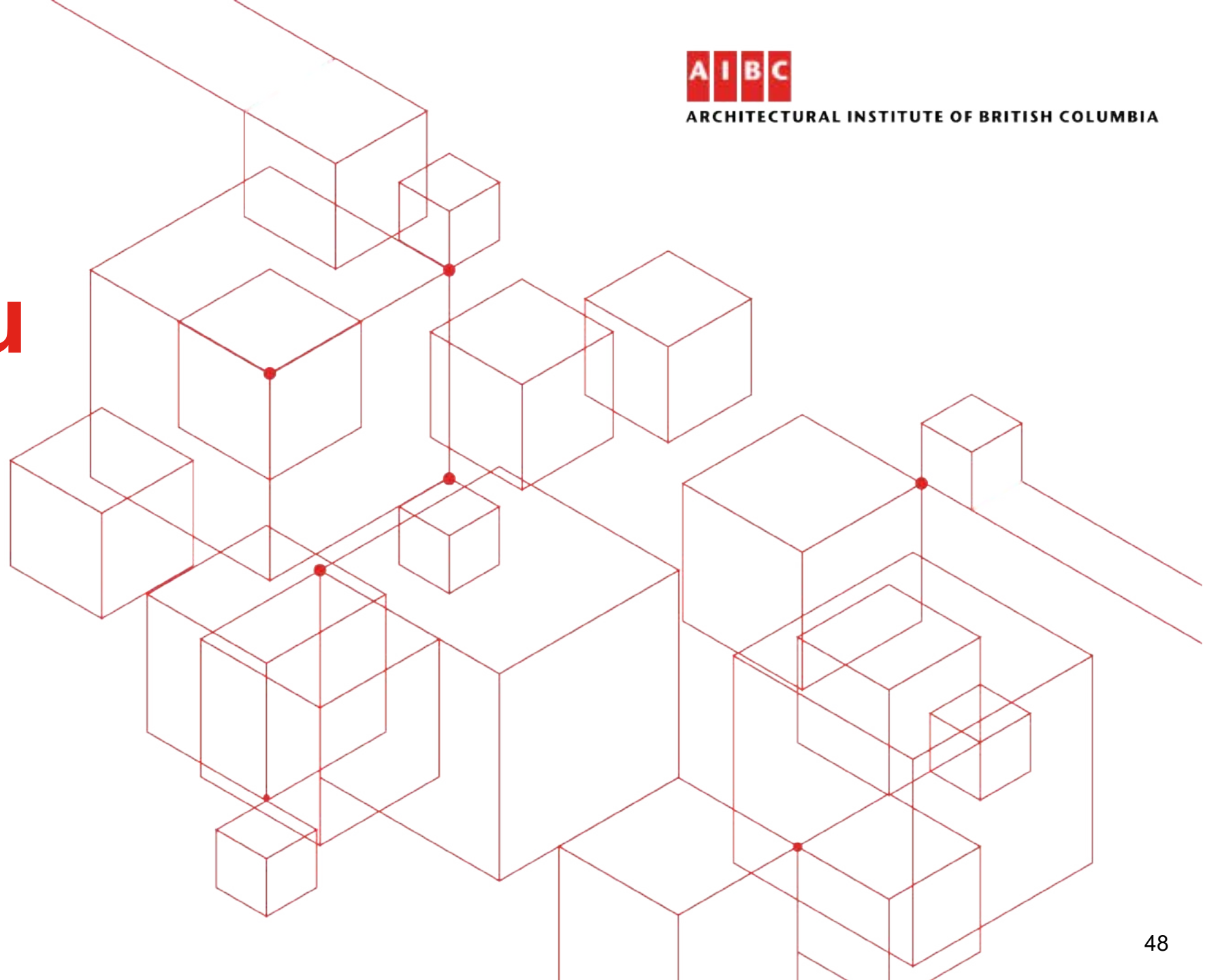
Tariff of Fees for Architectural Services Transportation Working Group

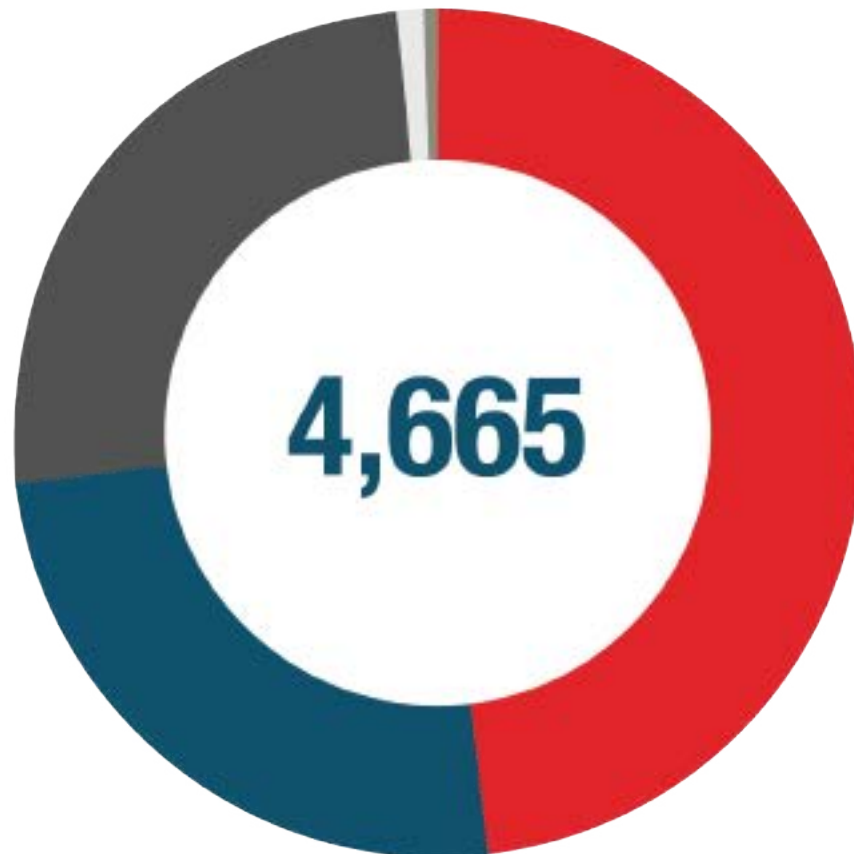


DUTIES OF THE REGISTRATION BOARD, SECTION 70

70 Subject to this Act and the approval of the council, the registration board must

- (a) set examinations for the purposes of this Act,
- (b) hold, supervise and mark the examinations,
- (c) report to the council the result of each candidate's examination,
- (d) consider and report to council on the qualifications of an applicant for admission as a member of the institute or as an associate, and
- (e) perform other duties referred to it by the council.

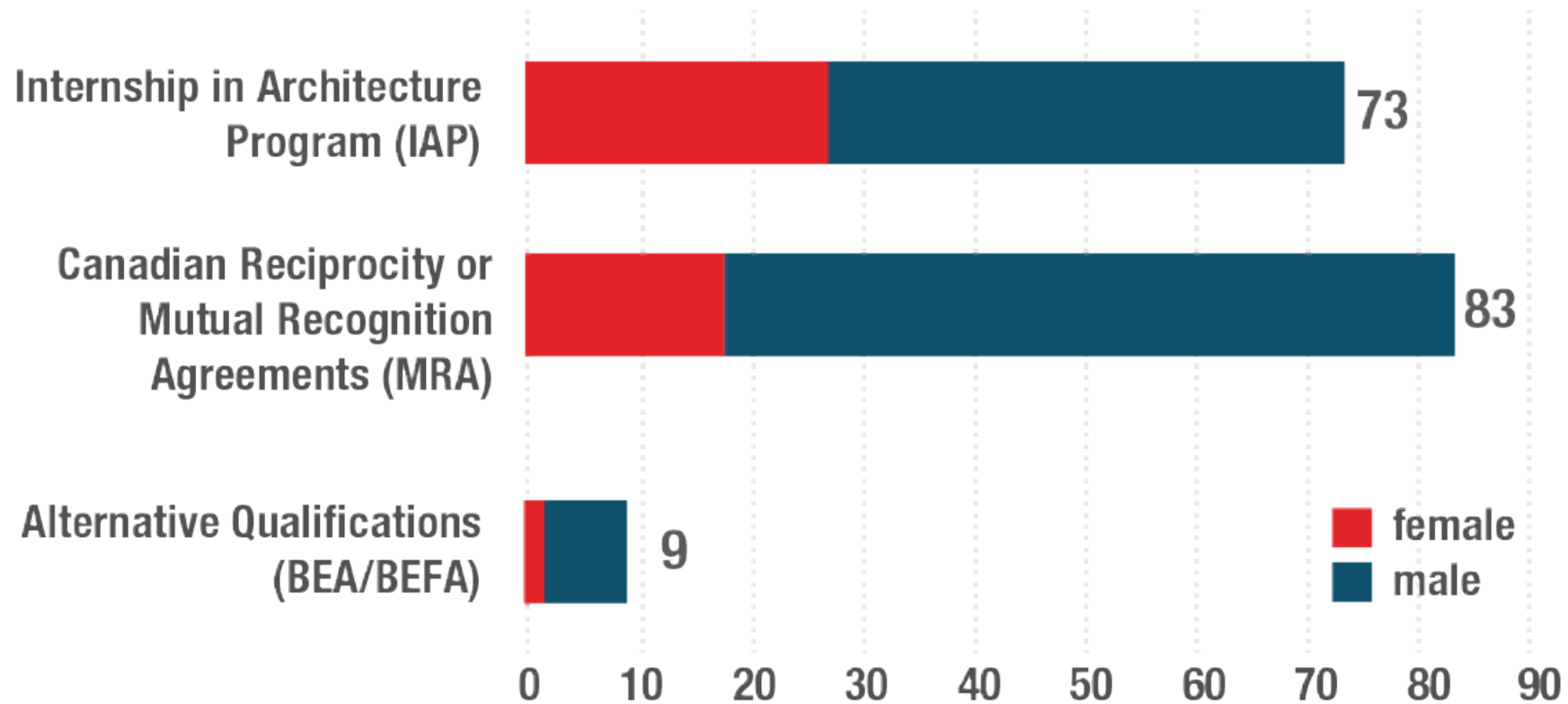

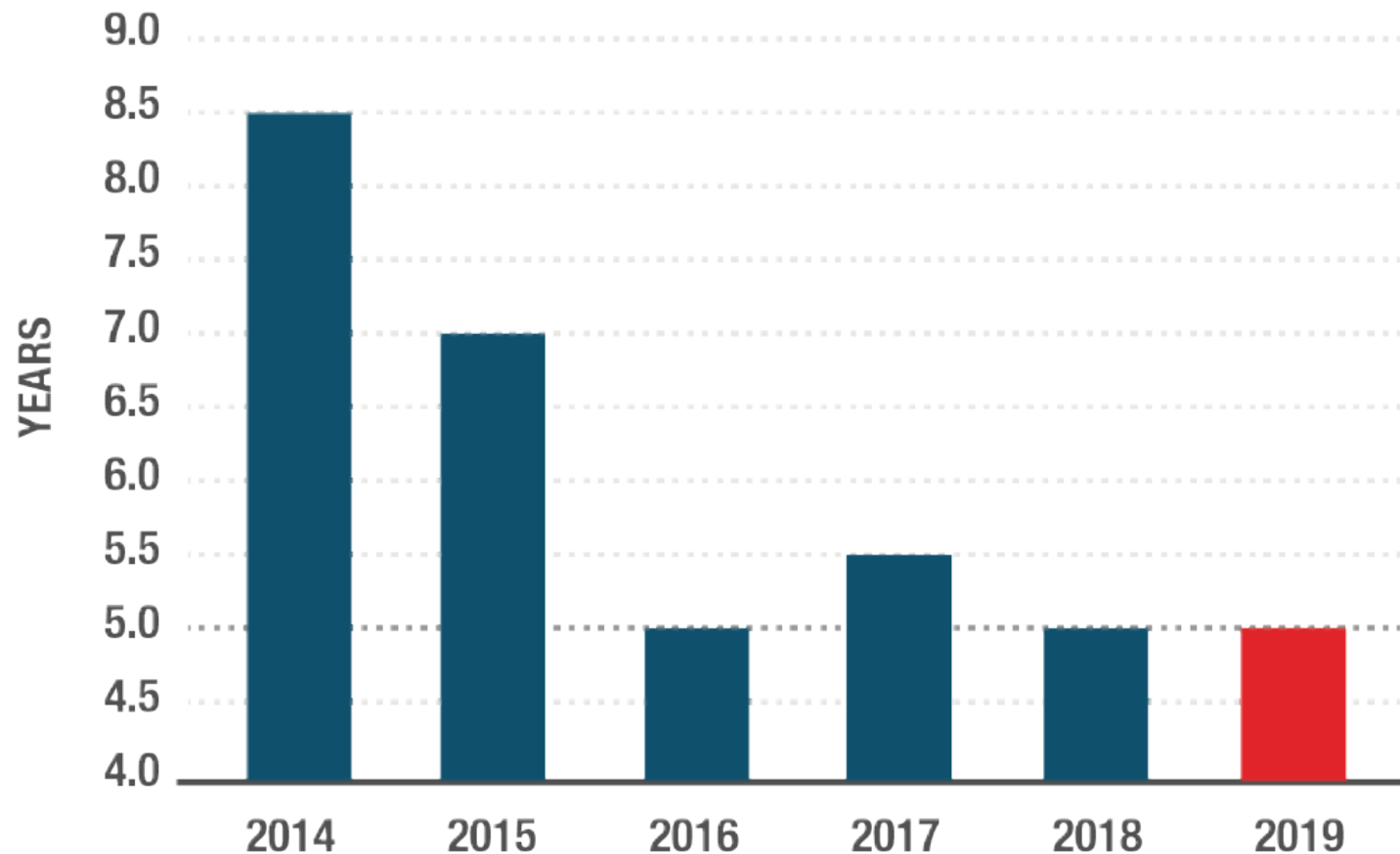

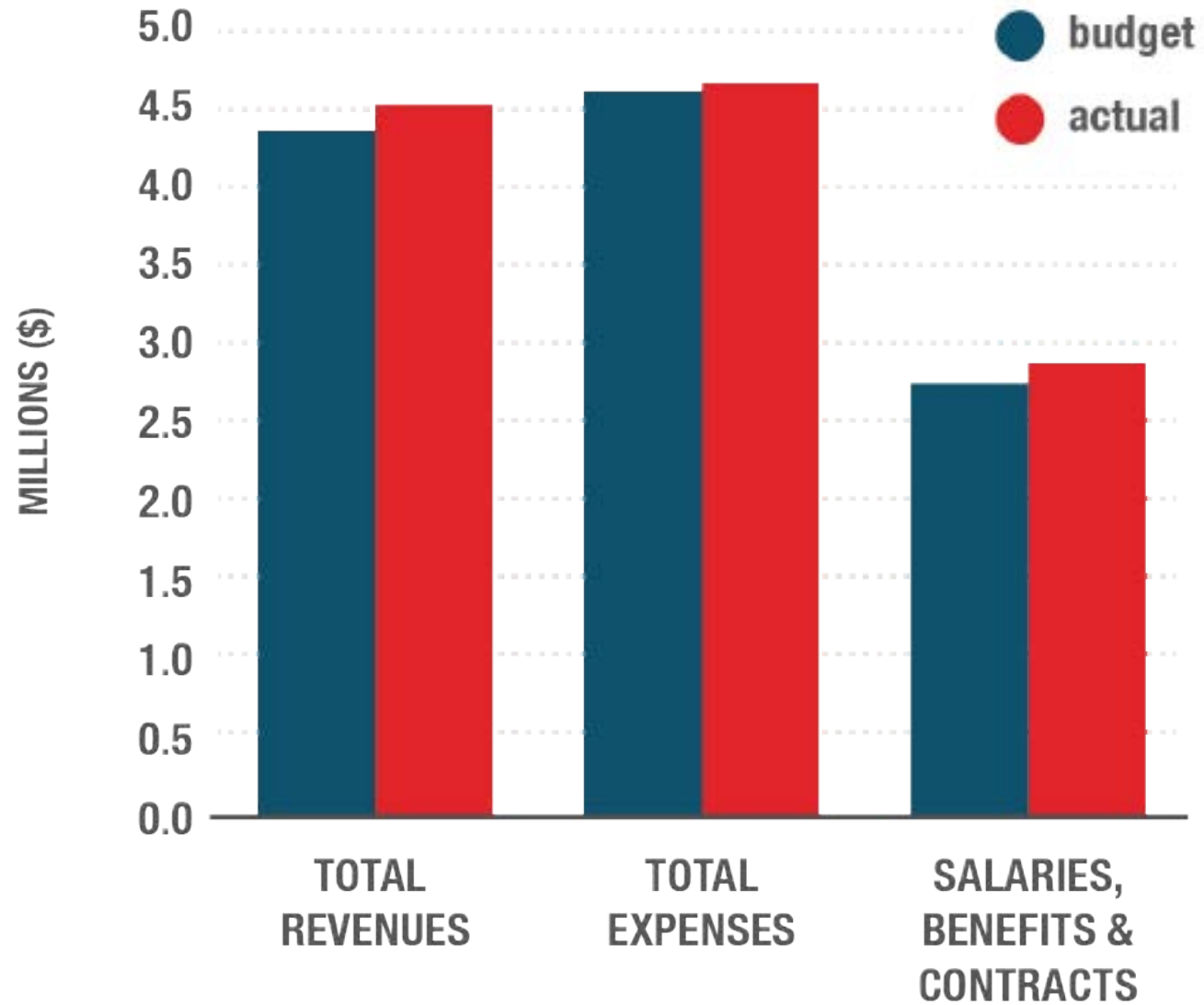
FINANCE COMMITTEE MANDATE

“To conduct ongoing overview of all aspects of the AIBC financial position and long term financial strategies to ensure the institute’s financial health.”

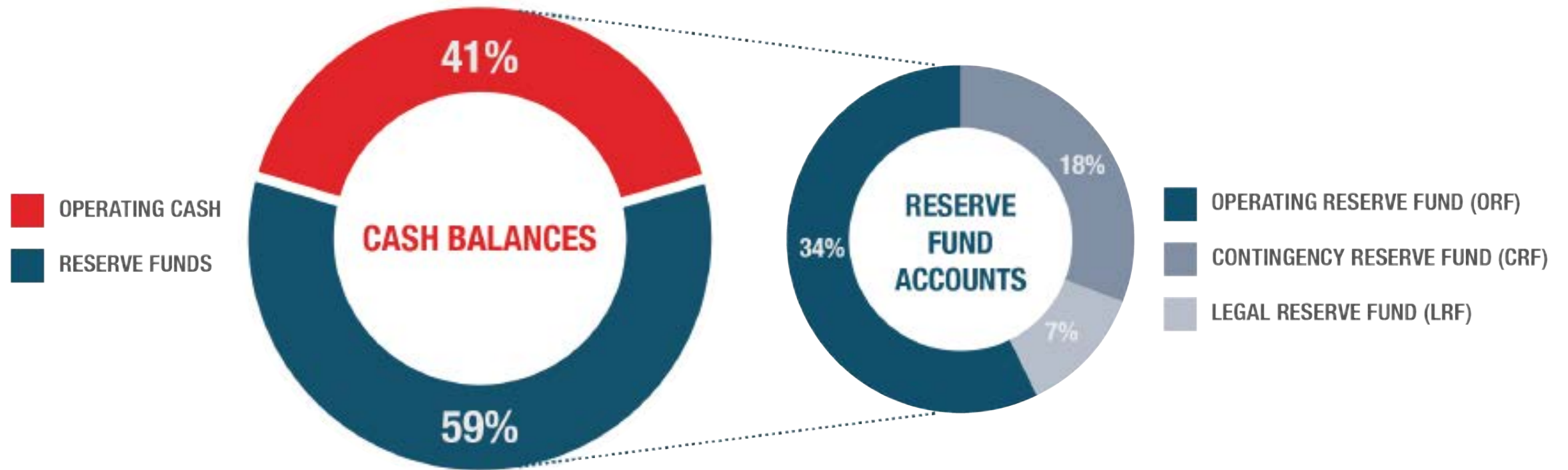
FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

- Audit by Baker Tilly WM LLP

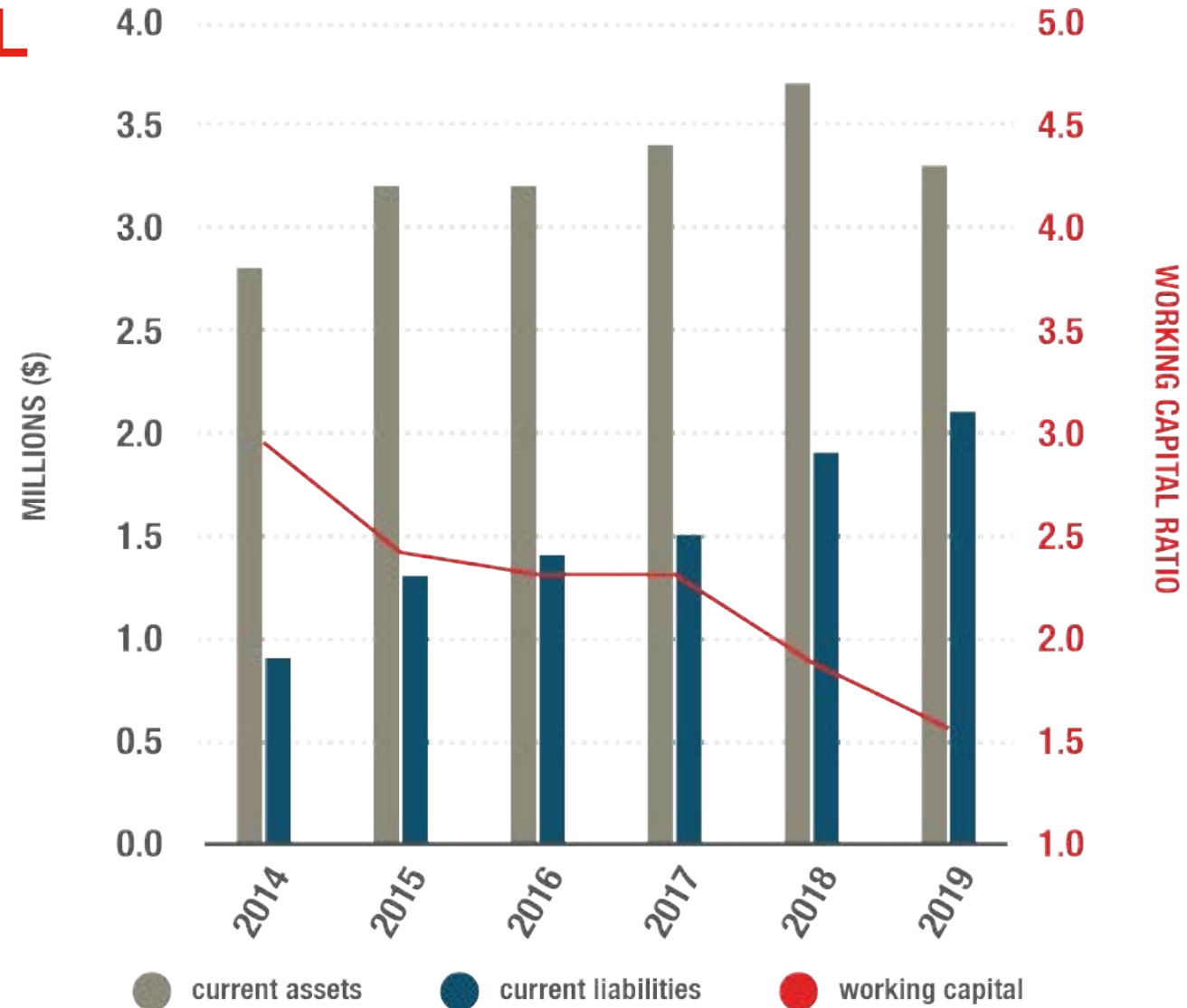
2019 BUDGET vs ACTUAL
